



The notion of "careful fit" guided this transformation of a historic barn and museum building to a visitor center and administration facility for Massachusetts Audubon. By relocating an old home to create a gateway to the sanctuary, contemporary uses and circulation patterns were gracefully integrated to this environmentally and historically sensitive site.


In a project partly orchestrated by WCA, 200 volunteers from the Elfin foundation transformed and modernized the existing barn and museum, and built a WCA-designed maintenance building in one weekend.








New facilities from old structures. The new nature center provides expanded space and facilities to better meet Audubon's mission for the sanctuary. Conversion of the existing barn to laboratory and program space improves research and education. The relocated home becomes office and conference space for staff. A new connector "gateway" offers restrooms, exhibit space, an admissions/sales office, and a kitchen.




Careful fit. The barn landscape plan protects key native trees and vegetation, while providing outdoor spaces for nature center programs.
